## OCEAN CONFERENCE LISBON, 2-6 JUNE 2020

- Knowledge and science are the foundation of effective management, which is the best means for conservation of fisheries
- Stamping out IUU is key to sustainable fisheries and to the conservation of aquatic resources.
- Aquaculture accounts for half of the aquatic foods we eat and is essential to sustainable diets of the future
- Fisheries and aquaculture not only make a great contribution to global food security but sustain national economies, particularly in SIDS and in least developed countries.
- Equitable, sustainable and resilient aquatic food systems can be achieved if transformation occurs across the entire value chain, from production to consumption.


## Focus of VCs in COA 9

Improve fisheries management
Ensure access to resources and markets
Build capacity to empower communities \& improve human and institutional knowledge \& transfer fishing technologies Improve compliance, monitoring and enforcement \& combat IUU Remove and reduce of harmful subsidies
Apply market measures, i.e. eco-labeling, traceability

## FAO commitments at UNOC II

\$1.5 million to implement Voluntary Guidelines on Small-Scale Fisheries;
i\$14 million global support to eliminate illegal, unregulated and unreported (IUU) fishing;
iui.
$\$ 53$ million to support the development of upgraded fisheries and aquaculture value chains, particularly in Small Island Developing States; $\$ 25$ million to achieve the strategy on fisheries and aquaculture sustainability in the Mediterranean and Black Sea.

## NEXT STEPS

1. Assess the progress of registered voluntary commitments;
2. Increase registrations of new voluntary commitments;
3. Develop mechanisms to foster greater exchange across COAs, so best practices can be exchanged
4. Increase multi-stakeholder interest and engagement in the Community of Ocean Action;
5. Maintain the momentum on ocean action ahead of the $3^{\text {rd }}$ UNOC in Nice, France in June 2025

2. Global push to step up action against illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing
3. WTO Agreement on Fisheries Subsidies
