Why Localization is Urgent

- **Local to global approach** Transforming SDGs into reality at the local level, in coherence with national frameworks
- **Direct impact on communities** LRGs deliver essential services and understand local needs
- Post-pandemic imperatives COVID-19 highlighted the importance of local action and resilience
- Critical time constraint Less than 5 years remain to achieve the 2030 Agenda

Why Multi-level Governance Matters for the SDGs



The Critical Role of Governance for Sustainable Development

- Integrated challenges require coordinated responses - The 17 SDGs address interconnected economic, social, and environmental issues
- Localization accelerates progress 65% of SDG targets cannot be reached without proper engagement of local and regional governments
- Balanced power distribution Effective governance balances authority across levels while maintaining coherence
- Context-sensitive implementation Local adaptation ensures solutions match territorial needs

Three Dimensions of Effective Multi-level Governance





Vertical Integration

Embedding SDGs at multiple levels of government

- Alignment of strategies across national, regional, and local levels
- Coordinated reporting through VNRs, VLRs and VSRs
- Clear mandates for local and regional governments
- Resource sharing and fiscal alignment



Horizontal Integration

Breaking silos to address the integrated nature of the SDGs

- Inter-ministerial and crossdepartmental coordination
- Whole-of-government approach to planning
- Cross-sectoral policy coherence
- City-to-city cooperation and knowledge exchange



Stakeholder Engagement

Enabling inclusive, participatory decision-making

- Civil society and private sector participation
- Participatory budgeting and cocreation
- Inclusive platforms for marginalized groups
- Accountability through public monitoring

These three dimensions are interconnected and mutually reinforcing. The most effective multilevel governance systems for SDG localization balance all three dimensions through coordinated institutional arrangements across the full policy cycle.
