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





Setting the scene



Over 600 million urban dwellers lack access to a basic sanitation services.



Another 1600 million have just basic sanitation services - waste untreated



Setting the scene



INEQUALITY

The urban poor pay more for sanitation than their rich neighbours, and often for substandard services.

HEALTH

Poor sanitation represents a public health risk for the whole city – eg cholera outbreaks

GENDER

Open defecation and reliance on poorly managed community or public toilets increases risk of gender based violence and reduces mobility



City-Wide Inclusive Sanitation – Four principles



Access for all: universal access, informal settlements, women and girls, O&M...



Whole service chain: ensure treatment via a diversity of solutions (on- and off-site)

Thriving economy: sanitation is vital for economy and planning, political will is key

Working partnerships: complementary services, governance, participation

Sakhipur – town-wide inclusive sanitation

Our approach:

- Set out a vision of 100% safely managed sanitation
- Get mayor on board and championing
- Local partner providing technical support

Whole chain intervention:


- Small vacuum truck for emptying pits
- Faecal Sludge Treatment Plant co-composting with solid waste
- Sale of compost to farmers

Sanitation as a service:

- Municipality led
- Get it into municipal budget








Female-friendly public and community toilets – a guide

"Paying special attention to the needs of women and girls" SDG 6.2

- Physiology
- Menstruation
- Pregnancy
- → Women need more space, privacy and time, and specific facilities.
- Social and cultural roles and responsibilities
- → Greater risk from sexual violence and harassment
- → Tend to be main caregiver, including sanitation needs
