

Summary of Brikama Local Government Area

The Brikama LGA is one of the most rapidly urbanizing regions that represents 37% of the population of The Gambia. It has a total land area of 1764.3km2 with a population density of 397 persons per square km.

The region has nine (9) districts, each headed by a chief, locally known as the (Seyfo).

We have 28 wards represented by Elected Ward Councilors and 9 nominated Councilors representing various interest groups.

The inhabitants earn their livelihoods through farming, horticultural, petty trading, fishing and clerical work with a recorded poverty rate of 51.2 percent, which is less than the national average of 53.4 percent.

The Voluntary Local Review Process

A VLR consultant was hired by UNDESA through UNRCO and GALGA, being the union of local governments in The Gambia, which serves as the coordinating body for the VLR. Brikama, Kanifing and Kuntaur Area Councils piloted the first VLR in 2022.

The VLR process was consultative and inclusive with key stakeholders participating in the process.

The Gambia had conducted a Voluntary National Review (VNR) in 2020 and 2022 respectively.

Challenges



Inadequate resources for the VLR process. As the first three VLRs (Brikama, Kanifing and Kuntaur), budgets were not available at the various councils and support was only received from UNDESA.




There was an apparent weakness in the coordination between and among sectors both at central and local levels, as well as inadequate online data; few sectors have data on their websites, and for those that have, most websites were not updated.



Low awareness of the two agendas: SDG 2030 and Africa Agenda 2063, especially at grassroot level.



Lack of monitoring and evaluation frameworks at the councils to adequately track SDG progresses.



Cont.

- Currently there is no National Dashboard that can support local monitoring and measurement for SDG localization.
- Capacity and Commitment of stakeholders is a challenge both at the regional and local level.
- poverty is now on the rise, particularly in the urban areas. This, combined with rising cost of consumer goods is having a negative impact on lives and livelihoods within the region and the Country.
- Decline of women in governance at the National Assembly, Ministries, Mayoral positions, etc.

Lessons Learnt



The need to raise the level of awareness about the agenda 2030 and to strengthen the capacities of councils to adequately review the SDGs.



Increase coordination with Civil Society and NGOs to leverage their capacities as well as enhance the alignment of their interventions with the Agenda 2030.



The need for Government and local councils to continue engagement, advocacy, and sensitization at all levels, to increase awareness of the SDGs.



The councils to ensure the mainstreaming of the SDGs into policies and strategies at regional, ward and village level.

Council to deepen private sector, civil society and academia participation through sustained engagement using the existing SDG institutional arrangements and partnerships.



Seneya Project: Council has launched a project in 2023 for waste collection in the urban growth centers within the region. This project is constraint by fleet of vehicles, poor access roads, and sanitary land fill for waste management. 'Seneya' in the local Mandinka language means Cleanliness hence the project name.




- Green Initiative: in 2023, council embarked on reforestation, mangrove restoration and street tree planting within three (3) communities within the region.
 - Reforestation was conducted in kanilai community forest
 - Mangrove restoration was conducted in Pirang community
 - Street tree planting was conducted in Kartong and Pirang communities respectively.



► Tesito Road Project: the Council has constructed a hundred- and twenty-six-meter (126m) access road to the main market in Brikama through a tesito work. 'Tesito' is a local Mandinka word that means self help.



Ward Allocations: in February, 2024, the Council disbursed fourteen million dalasis (D14,000,000.00) to the twenty-eight (28) wards within the region. Each ward received five hundred thousand dalasis (D500,000.00) to implement community priority projects. These projects are mainly on provision and extension of portable water, feeder roads construction, community market constructions and electricity expansion. These projects are geared towards the attainment of the SDGs within the region.




website: the council has developed a website which is under construction. This website will be able to publish council activities and it will be accessible to the public for perusal and comments. This website will serve as a tool to improve our local governance system and also accelerate the attainment of the SDGs.



Women in Governance: looking at the low rate of women elected councilors within the region (5 elected women councilors out of 28 wards), the council has nominated more women for the various interest groups than men.
